There will be no General Assembly Chapter meetings in November due to the Oblation Ceremony. The cells will be meeting.

OBLATION CEREMONY: Let us join those who have heard God's call to share in the Benedictine way of Life by making their Final Oblation, and welcome those who are making their Initial Oblation. Sr. Phyllis Hunhoff, Sr. Penny Bingham, and Sr. Joelle Bauer will be coming from Sacred Heart Monastery for the ceremony.

The oblation ceremony will be held on Sunday, November 11, at 2:00 PM in the James E Ryan Chapel at Madonna. We will have Vespers, First Oblation for new members, Final Oblation for Novice Oblates, and Renewal of Oblation. A Reception will follow in the North Commons: Friends and family are invited to attend.

If you're making your initial or final oblation, and are unable to attend the oblation ceremony, please let one of the Deans know. We'll have a ceremony before December Vespers, or individually, as needed.

REFLECTION-Benedictines at Heart

Our little band of Omaha Benedictine Oblates was informed by our counterparts in Lincoln charged with the newsletter that our turn has come to provide a reflection for our November issue. When I personally became involved with the Oblates through Sister Marietta Kerkvliet OSB, our Religious Education Director for our parish in 2004, Benedictines were at that time completely unknown to me. Through Sister however, I learned that a part of Oblate formation involved learning Morning and Evening Prayer, something as a Catholic I had long

wondered about, and eventually realized would be wonderful to learn. So, I accepted to attend a General Omaha Chapter meeting that fall. I became immediately suspicious however. The meeting was held in the basement of All Saints Episcopal Church in Omaha! Upon arriving, my disquiet did not improve for in attendance in addition to Sister Marietta and Sister Phyllis Hunhoff OSB, our Oblate Director, was an Episcopal priest (!) and members of other denominations! There were a number of others from All Saints! A Lutheran and even an Assembly of God practitioner were also present! This at first completely unnerved me and my anxiety was evident as it was very difficult to speak during the introductions. The terror was compounded as I by nature am struck with paralyzing fright any time I am before a group trying to speak! I survived that first meeting however and determined to persevere. Both Sister Marietta and Sister Phyllis were rocks of reassurance, and I did want to learn Morning and Evening Prayer!

As the year continued and exposure to the Rule unfolded through formation; and as I began to allow myself to truly listen to this little community of incredible Christians, the anxiety began to subside and the glow of our shared Faith began to overtake the darkness! I began to realize these beautiful Christians, Catholic and Protestant, were and are all just like me – we are all seeking Christ! And we are all in this together (Sirach)! None of us are theologians. We have the wonderful opportunity of allowing the Love of God to diffuse itself as we all focus on what we are truly gathered for, to learn and be profoundly influenced by the wisdom of Benedict in our quest for our Savior. We are Roman Catholic, Episcopalian, Baptist, and in the past, Lutheran and Assembly of God, all charitably bound, fulfilling in this little way Our Lord's great mandate to love one another, the mark and gift of the Holy Spirit, and of our ancient Faith.

This year we are methodically reviewing our "Handbook of Benedictine Oblates" so wonderfully

provided by our Director, Sister Phyllis and the Sacred Heart Monastery; and presently the “Guidelines for Oblates of Saint Benedict” contained within: “They foster the ecumenical spirit... and foster the spirit of universal brotherhood in God our Father...” A, 8: Guidelines for Oblates of Saint Benedict - a wellspring for hospitality, the effects of the Holy Spirit in each of us through Our Lord’s Mystical Body – That in All Things God May Be Glorified!
