REV. ANSELM GRUEN, OSB, TO SPEAK AT ST.

BENEDICT CENTER: The Rev. Anselm Gruen, OSB, Ph.D., one of the most frequently read spiritual authors of our time, will present a one-day retreat at St. Benedict Center, four miles north of Schuyler on Saturday, June 14, 2008. His retreat will be titled, Benedict of Nursia: His Message for Today. Father Anselm is a Benedictine monk of the Abbey of Muensterschwarzach in Germany. From the Rule of St. Benedict, Fr. Anselm learned how to guide people. Already in the 1970s, he rediscovered the tradition of the early desert monks, whose importance he sees especially in conjunction with modern psychology. He is widely respected for his ability to present classic Christian spirituality in a modern context. In his numerous retreats and talks around the world. Fr. Anselm, a counselor and advisor, sought-after speaker and retreat master, responds to the needs and questions of the people. His books, among them Benedict of Nursia: His Message for Today (Liturgical Press 2006) and Angels of Grace (Crossroad; Continuum), are international bestsellers (300 titles available and 14 Mill. copies sold worldwide). He will come to us from Germany for this special event. The retreat runs from 10 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; registration begins at

We want to know who is in the hospital recovering from surgery or some one who is struggling with family issues. Making it a little more generic will make sure that we are not crossing someone's boundary.

OBLATE MEMORIAL SERVICE (at the time of death): I realized that I have not shared this service with you and we have been using it for a number of years. It has always been so appreciated by the loved ones. I consider it a little service thanking God for the person's life and recognizing the person's commitment to her/his spiritual life. As I was visiting about it recently, there was a request to see it and to have it available so it could become a part of one's preparation for death and final service. When an Oblate dies, I visit with the family or loved ones about it and if they wish, we will plan when it will be said, for instance prior to a wake service, privately or even during the funeral service. Traditionally, Oblates were allowed to be buried in the garb of their particular monastery. Since today, there is no garb, a black Benedict/Scholastica scapular is used in its place. Last week, when Oblate Anne Johnson died in Washington, D.C., her family asked if one of the monks of St. Anselm Abbey, there in Washington, would come to say the prayers, which one did. I thought that was very special.

OBLATE MEMORIAL PRAYER SERVICE Sacred Heart Monastery Nebraska Chapters

"You broke the Reign of Death, O Lord"

Body and Coffin or remains are sprinkled with Holy Water. A scapular of St. Benedict & St. Scholastica is placed on left shoulder or around remains.

Copy of the final Oblation is placed on/in the coffin or given to family.

Leader: From the Rule of St. Benedict (Chapter 7) "The fourth degree of humility is that when obedience to God's will becomes difficult...one's heart quietly embraces suffering and endures it without weakening or seeking escape." For scripture says: "Anyone who perseveres to the end will be saved (Matt 10:22)", and again, "Be brave of heart and rely on the Lord (Ps 26:14)".
