MORNING PRAYER

Oblates gather every Friday morning at 7:30 in the chapel at Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital, 5401 South St., Lincoln, Nebraska, to pray Morning Prayer. Everyone is welcome.

FEAST OF ST. THOMAS BECKETT

Sunday, December 29, 2013, we will have Vespers at 5:30 p.m. in the chapel at Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital. This evening's vespers celebrates the life of St. Thomas Beckett. Born in London on December 21, 1118 (?), Beckett was martyred at Canterbury on December 29, 1170. After a falling out with King Henry II over the rights and privileges of the Church, Beckett and was murdered in Canterbury Cathedral by followers of the king. He was honored as St. Thomas of Canterbury. His tomb was a popular

pilgrimage site during the Middle Ages until it was destroyed in 1538. Thomas Beckett's feast day is celebrated on December 29.

The Lincoln Chapter offers Vespers monthly, marking the lives of other memorable Benedictines.

SHORTER CHRISTIAN PRAYER FOR ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS

Sunday, December 1, is the first Sunday of Advent and the beginning of the new liturgical year.

We begin this new church year with Week I on p. 37. Note that Psalm Antiphons 1, 2, and 3 are those for Advent. At the Reading, turn to the Advent Season, which can be found on pp. 356–378.

Christmas readings begin on Wednesday, December 25, on p. 380.

Morning and Evening Prayer for the weekdays during the Christmas Season are found on pp. 392–395. The psalms and canticles for Morning Prayer are on p. 384, while those for Evening Prayer are found on p. 387. Repeat the Christmas Season weekday readings until Epiphany, January 5.

The Sunday after Christmas is the Feast of the Holy Family. Antiphons and concluding prayer can be found on p. 396.

Reflection

THE GREAT "O ANTIPHONS"

The "O Antiphons" refer to the seven Magnificat antiphons recited during Vespers. They cover the special period of Advent preparation known as the Octave before Christmas, Dec. 17–23. Each one highlights a title for the Messiah and refers to the prophecy of Isaiah of the coming of the Messiah.

The "O Antiphons" date back to the fourth century. The Latin versions of each of the titles of the Messiah are: *Sapientia* (Wisdom), *Adonai* (Lord), *Radix* (Root), *Clavis* (Key), *Oriens* (Dawn), *Rex* (King), and *Emmanuel* (Emmanuel). Take the first letters of each of the titles, starting with the last and working back to the first to spell: *EROCRAS* or "ero cras"—"I will be (there) tomorrow."

The song "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" is created from the seven "O Antiphons." When you sing it, you are joining yourself to a vast throng of

Christians, stretching back across centuries and spanning the whole of the earth, who prayed as all Christians do—"Come, Lord Jesus!" (See Rev. 22:20.)

The "O Antiphons" may be substituted for the Advent antiphons in *Shorter Christian Prayer* for December 17–23.

O ANTIPHONS: THE MAGNIFICAT ANTIPHONS

Dec. 17: O Sapientia: "O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation."

Dec. 18: *O Adonai*: "O sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free."

Dec. 19: *O Radix Jesse:* "O Flower of Jesse's stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid."

Dec. 20: O Clavis David: "O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of Heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom."

Dec. 21: *O Oriens:* "O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death."

Dec. 22: *O Rex Gentium:* "O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust."

Dec. 23: *O Emmanuel:* "O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Savior of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God."

Dec. 24: Christmas Vigil.

Tuesday, July 30: Just a few notes from some previous conversations. The people would eat seeds and whatever they could find. They are very matter-of-fact about their lives. They truly live one day at a time. They love each other and live their faith.
