ADVENT/COME LORD JESUS! As we move into Advent, "Come Lord Jesus" is our mantra! Each of the Sunday readings build on the next with the expectation of Jesus' coming. In the first Sunday readings, Jeremiah says, "The days are coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made (33:14)" and Luke says, "Raise your heads because your redemption is at hand (21:28)."

Already in the second Sunday, Luke shows us the exhilaration of John the Baptist who quotes from Isaiah, "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths...all flesh shall see the salvation of God (3:4-6)."

The third Sunday is "Rejoice" Sunday and Paul says in the Philippians, "Rejoice in the Lord always, I shall say again: rejoice! Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near! (4:4-5)"

And as we close in on the last few days, Micah tells us in the fourth Sunday reading, "He shall stand firm and Shepard his flock by the strength of the Lord...for now his greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth; he shall be peace. (4:4-5)"

THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD JESUS

CHRIST Even though our readings may differ somewhat, they all give us the anticipation of Christmas. And as we arrive on that day, Isaiah says, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. (9:1)" Titus says, "The grace of God has appeared. (2:11)" And finally, Luke gives us this jubilant moment: "And suddenly there was a multitude of the heavenly host with the angel, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests.' (2:14)" My Advent and Christmas wish for you is that you take the time to enjoy the beauty of the scripture readings where Jesus Christ becomes real to us as the WORD becomes flesh. We are now the carriers of this good news and we proclaim our salvation! Blessings and PEACE! Sister Phyllis

OPPORTUNITES TO LEARN AT SHM: The following will be available this summer at the monastery should you know of someone who may have an interest.

- Monastic Experience: July 17 24, 2004: A special time to live at the Monastery and follow the horarium/prayers of the Sisters. This experience might range from a weekend to a month in length (or at another scheduled time). Audience: Women who would like to examine religious life and would be eligible to pursue that consideration.
