TEXT FOR CELLS: I am pleased to announce that the book we will be using for our Cells this year in Lincoln, Hastings and Steinauer is <u>Crises of Faith</u>, <u>Crises of Love</u> by Thomas Keating, a Cistercian. Working from the experiences of the later mystics Keating offers the spiritual sense of scripture elaborated by the Fathers and Mothers of the Church, which has been used repeatedly to illustrate insights useful to the various stages of spiritual development. This rich storytelling tradition traces a spiritual journey, outlining a way of listening to God by sharpening the habit of contemporary prayer.

Fr. Thomas has written articles and books that deal with contemplative prayer, especially Centering Prayer. He says, we are a Cistercian (Trappist) community founded in 1956. Our 900-year-old Cistercian tradition has its roots in the Rule of St. Benedict, which dates back 1500 years.

A THEME FOR 2005-2006: As we "begin again" this fall, there is one area of emphasis where I would like to encourage you - as there is nothing that will bring you into the realm of God's grace as a thoughtful, persistent practice of Lectio Divina. In the monastic way of doing Lectio Divina we listen to how God is addressing us in a particular text or scripture. We open ourselves to a receptive disposition to enable the Holy Spirit to speak to us. We use the slow, contemplative reading to allow ourselves to break into the veil of our own ways of thinking. Hence, our attentiveness to God expands into the awareness of the divine presence.

Both in preparation for our General Assembly Chapter faith sharing groups and for the Cells, Lectio is a dedicated daily event in our lives as we use our prescribed text, rather than an hour of quick reading just prior to the session.

THE NORTH AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF BENEDICTINE OBLATE DIRECTORS met at Sacred Heart Monastery and Mount Marty College from July 29 to August 3. This found eight of our Lincoln Oblates, Lou Ann Green, Wilma White, Scott Dolton, Carol Barry, Teresa Harms, Ginger Goomis, Richard Palazzolo and Sarah Weaver along with Vic Faesser and his wife, Irene, from Steinauer all volunteering the many

tasks there were to make such a large event run smoothly.
