OBLATES GATHER FOR RETREAT ON THOMAS MERTON

On October 30 and 31, six Benedictine oblates from the Lincoln Chapter attended a retreat at St. Benedict Center in Schuyler, Nebraska. Entitled "Thomas Merton and Proven Spiritual Tools

of the Monastic Tradition," this retreat was given by Sr. Mary Margaret Funk, OSB. Sr. Meg is from Our Lady of Grace Monastery, Beech Grove, Indiana. She provided excellent teaching in relating portions of Merton's contemplative wisdom, discussing his life as a Trappist monk, and identifying teachings from John Cassian that Merton used in his writings.

Thomas Merton was born January 31, 1915; thus this year of 2015 has been the one-hundredth anniversary of his birth. Merton was born in France where his mother and father were both artists. His mother, an American woman, died when he was only five; and his father, from New Zealand, died when he was fifteen. Orphaned at a young age, Merton went on to study at Cambridge in England and Columbia in New York City. He was probably on his way to being a literary genius, when he converted to Catholicism in his early twenties and entered the Cistercian Abbey of Gethsemani in Louisville, Kentucky, at the age of twenty-six. Merton lived the remainder of his life as a contemplative, served as novice master at Gethsemani, and became a prodigious author. Merton died unexpectedly of an accidental electrocution in Thailand at the age of fifty-three.

According to Sr. Meg, "The genius of Merton is that he's not a saint, nor did he want to be a saint." It appears that countless people around the world can identify with the humanness of Merton. However, he did write over seventy books, thousands of letters, poetry, and has been the subject of over 400 doctoral dissertations. Merton remained keenly interested in the social issues of his time and was continually concerned about social justice. He was a critic and had a critical mind, but those who knew him well also speak of his compassion for humanity.

Sr. Meg shared with the participants at the retreat that Merton had an expansive view of the world, he used his voice to inspire others, and he found his voice through his vocation. Gethsemani proved to be an ideal place, an ideal container for Merton. Sr. Meg helped us understand what an extraordinary human being he was and how his influence seems to be growing exponentially in our world today. In order to understand Thomas Merton better, Sr. Meg recommended the following books authored by Merton: *Seven Storey Mountain, Conjectures of a Guilty Bystander,* and *New Seeds of Contemplation.*

Sr. Meg concluded the retreat on Saturday afternoon by connecting the teachings of Thomas Merton to Origen, John Cassian, and St. Benedict. She provided an excellent review of afflictions of the Christian life and associated antidotes. Borrowing from her own writings contained in her books, *Thoughts Matter* and *Tools Matter*, she helped participants understand the need for renunciation of thoughts when they lead to afflictions. Afflictions, arising from our thoughts, lead to desires, habits, compulsions, and ultimate captivity of the soul. Good thoughts are considered virtuous and bad thoughts lead to vice. If we choose not to deal with our thoughts, then afflictions become obstacles to living our true vocations. She believes much of the *Rule of St. Benedict* provides "antidotes" to afflictions as we choose to live our lives in a manner that is virtuous and renounce thoughts that lead to afflictions.

Sr. Meg's presentation was punctuated with simple tunes she played for us on her small wooden recorder, and her understanding of Thomas Merton and what he has to offer our world today was inspiring. The retreat concluded with a mass at 4:00 p.m. at St. Benedict Center. *Charlotte Liggett, Lincoln Oblate*

INSTRUCTIONS FOR SHORTER CHRISTIAN PRAYER

Advent marks the beginning of the Liturgical Year. Sunday, November 29, 2015 is the first Sunday of Advent. We begin with Evening Prayer 1 on Saturday night, p. 37 in *Shorter Christian Prayer*. At the Reading, turn to p. 356. Weekdays in Advent are on pp. 358–376, and are repeated each week during Advent. On Sundays in Advent, note that the Advent Antiphons are shown in red in the Psalmody. There is a selection of Advent hymns on p. 578. If you would like, you can substitute the "O Antiphons" on December 17–23 for the Magnificat antiphon. On Christmas Eve Day, Morning Prayer, turn to p. 378. Christmas Day prayers start on Christmas Eve with Evening Prayer I on p. 380.

During the Christmas Season, for weekdays after Christmas, see pp. 392–395. Continue following the prayers for the Christmas Season until the Feast of the Epiphany.

We wish you a joyous season of preparation as we anticipate the birth of our Savior!

O ANTIPHONS: ANTIPHONS FOR THE MAGNIFICAT DEC. 17–23

- **17** *O Sapientia:* "O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation."
- **18** *O Adonai*: "O sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free."
- **19** *O Radix Jesse:* "O Flower of Jesse's stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid."
- **20** O *Clavis David:* "O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of Heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom."
- **21** O *Oriens:* "O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death."
- **22** O *Rex Gentium:* "O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust."
- **23** *O Emmanuel:* "O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Savior of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God."
