THE SEASON OF ADVENT

Advent (from the Latin word adventus, means "coming") is a season of the Christian church, the period of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus, the period immediately before Christmas.

By the end of the fourth century, this season which opens the liturgical year, was given some framework, about the same time as the celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany (the three kings) were being organized. The length and time of these preparations differed from place to place. It was in the seventh century that Christmas and also Advent took on a significant meaning. And gradually Christmas and Epiphany, each a separate feast, became the celebrations of the birth of Christ the King. Hence, we do not see Advent and Christmas mentioned in any of the twelve chapters on the liturgy of the Holy Rule of St. Benedict.

Advent has three dimensions. We constantly shift our attention to the past, the present and future comings of Jesus. We remember Jesus' past birth over 2,000 years ago and hope for his future return in glory. But we cannot neglect the present.

Through the mysterious activity of God's Holy Spirit, the Jesus who was born in the past in Bethlehem and who will come in the future is now present to us and within us through grace. Jesus comes to us now in word and sacrament, in prayer and praise, in one another, in body, the Church and in all creation.

So in this Advent season as we begin a new Church year, we focus our attention on the demands of responding to Jesus' presence by following him on the way to discipleship. The lectionary focus for the first two Sunday's of this year on Mark's gospel is particularly suited to enhance our experience of preparing and following this way of commitment, conversion and cooperation in the saving work of Jesus for our world today.

As we live through the seasons of the Church year, we will learn that the way of Christian discipleship leads from the joys and difficulties of ministry through suffering of the cross to the experience of new life. Preparing the way is the first step to which our Advent experience is directed. (Living in Christ 08-09)

November 30: First Sunday of Advent (Mark 13:33-37) Theme: Lord-Redeemer

Jesus said: "Be careful! Be alert! You do not know when the time will come. It is like a man traveling abroad. He leaves home and places his servants in charge......May he not come suddenly and find you sleeping. What I say to you, I say to all: 'Watch!'"

December 7: Second Sunday of Advent (Mark 1:1-8) Theme: Repentance

John the Baptist appeared in the desert proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. People of the whole Judean countryside and all the inhabitants of Jerusalem were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins......This is what he proclaimed: "One mightier than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

December 14: Third Sunday of Advent (John 1:6-8, 19-28) Theme: Rejoice

"A man named John was sent from God. He came for testimony to testify to the light so that all might believe through him. He was not the light, but came to testify to the light....they

sent those to ask him, "Who are you?" He admitted, "I am not the Christ." Are you Elijah? Are you the prophet? He answered, "No." "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert; make straight the way of the Lord."

December 21: Fourth Sunday of Advent (Luke 1:26-38) Theme: Saying "Yes" to God.

"The angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph....and coming to her, he said, 'Hail full of grace! The Lord is with you.'Then the angel said,' Do not be afraid, Mary for you have found favor with God......The Holy Spirit will come upon you and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore the child will be called holy, the Son of God."
