Reflection

A PRAYER IN EACH FINGER

NOTE: Pope Francis shared the following reflection with young people who gathered in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, this past summer for the sixth World Youth Day. Joanna Kennedy, Lincoln oblate, translated the Holy Father's presentation from the Spanish version.

- 1. The thumb is nearest to you. So start praying for those who are closest to you. They are the persons easiest to remember. To pray for our loved ones is "a sweet obligation."
- 2. Following is the index finger. Pray for those who teach, instruct, and heal. This includes teachers, professors, medical personnel, and religious workers. They need support and wisdom to indicate to others the correct direction they should take. Always have them present in your prayers.
- 3. Then comes the tallest finger. We remember our leaders. Pray for the president, congress, and people in business and industry. These persons direct the destiny of our nation and

- guide public opinion. They need God's guidance.
- 4. The fourth is known as our ring finger. Many may be surprised that it is our weakest finger, as any musician will tell you. We should remember those who are most vulnerable, the people with a lot of problems or who are bedridden due to infirmities. They need our prayers day and night; it will never be enough. We should also remember married couples.
- 5. The last is our little finger, the smallest of them all. This is what we should be before God and others. The Bible says, "The last shall be first." This little finger should remind you to pray for yourself. After you have prayed for the other four groups, you will see your needs in the correct perspective, and you will be able to better pray for them.
