KINDNESS

How kindly and sweetly the Child rested in the arms of Simeon, when He was brought to the temple! Pray that this Beloved of yours take His rest in the arms of your soul, and bestow on you an affectionate kindliness and sweetness of heart for all.

With what kindness He washes the feet of His disciples and kisses them! And in the same way how affectionately He gives Himself to the apostles and to us in the sacrament of the Eucharist! How affectionately He encourages the apostles during the supper and after it! Do you be kind to all without exception, even though they be rude and opposed to you.

How kindly He received the heavy cross that was laid upon Him, how gently He bore the weight of sin, and how He consoled the weeping women! Do not refuse to bear the yoke of the Savior with kindliness and cheerfulness, without complaint, even though you think it is heavier than you have deserved. Do not be gloomy under the burden you have accepted, do not look for a partner in your suffering, but rather share the sufferings of others, and help them when you can, or when others ask or look to you for help.

How kind He is, as the moment of crucifixion approaches; helping His executioners when they try to remove the clothing that clings to his wounds! So you should be kind to those who point out the faults of which you are ridding yourself, and offer yourself to them with kindness and eagerness so that they may lead you wherever they wish.

REMINDER: FEAST OF ST. THOMAS BECKETT

Sunday, December 29, 2013, we will have Vespers at 5:30 p.m. in the chapel at Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital. This evening's vespers celebrates the life of St. Thomas Beckett.

FEAST OF ST. ANTHONY OF EGYPT (A.D. 251-356)

At 5:30 pm. on Friday, January 17, 2014, those who can attend will gather in the Ryan Memorial Chapel at Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital, Lincoln, for Vespers to celebrate the feast of St. Anthony. The life of Anthony is reminiscent of St. Francis of Assisi in that Anthony was so moved by the Gospel message, "Go, sell what you have, and give to [the] poor" (Mark 10:21b), that he did just that with his large inheritance.

Unlike St. Francis, Anthony spent most of his life in solitude. He gave the world the witness of solitary asceticism, great personal mortification, and prayer. He drew many people to himself for spiritual healing and guidance and founded a monastery of scattered cells in the desert in response to many requests. He failed in his hope of becoming a martyr in the Roman persecution of 311, in spite of fearlessly exposing himself to danger while giving moral and material support to those in prison.

Anthony is associated in art with a T-shaped cross, a pig, and a book. The pig and the cross are symbols of his warfare with the devil—the cross his means of power over evil spirits, the pig a symbol of the devil himself. Anthony died in solitude at the age of 105.

The Lincoln Chapter offers Vespers monthly, marking the lives of memorable Benedictines. Here

are the occasions for Vespers for the next several months:

- Mar. 21 (Fri.)—Death of Fr. Benedict
- Apr. 21 (Mon.)—Anselm (Day after Easter)
- May 15 (Thurs.)—Pachomius.

SHORTER CHRISTIAN PRAYER FOR CHRISTMAS AND EPIPHANY

On January 1, we start on p. 384. There are special antiphons and concluding prayers on pp. 396–397, beginning with Evening Prayer I. For the weekdays after Christmas we start on p. 384, then switch to pp. 393–395.

On the Feast of the Epiphany (January 5), begin on p. 384. There are special antiphons and concluding prayers on pp. 397–398.

Morning Prayer for the weekdays after Epiphany begins on p. 384. At the readings, turn to p. 399 for Morning Prayer and p. 400 for Evening Prayer.

On the Baptism of the Lord, Sunday, January 12, begin with Morning Prayer on. p. 384. There are special antiphons and concluding prayers on pp. 403–404.

On the Monday after the Baptism of the Lord, January 13, we begin Ordinary time with Week I on p. 54. There is no more page-flipping until Lent!
