

of "The Matters Series," this book provides a background of John Cassian's "Eight Thoughts" (Cassian had a significant influence on Benedict and his Rule) as well as a brief history into spiritual practices that benefit the Discernment process, and the Discernment process itself.

Discernment comes from a word meaning to "sift out"; it is a way of listening to one's inner self as well as God's voice as heard in daily life, our relationships, and our activities. It is very helpful to understand this process as a Benedictine Oblate, especially as we ask the

deep questions in our lives: "What is God calling me to do? What do I really want? How can I live as an Oblate?" It may help us in other areas as well.

Join us as we learn more about this essential process.



There are spaces available for the Oblate Retreat scheduled for October 31 to November 2, 2014, at Sacred Heart Monastery, Yankton, South Dakota. The retreat will explore the themes that St. Benedict uses when describing the heart of a monk. It will begin the evening of October 31 and end the morning of November 2. The cost for a single room, including meals, is \$120; a room with two people is \$170. Reflection

SACRED LEISURE

A beautiful part of our Oblate experience, at least for our group in Omaha is our "Oblate Prayer," which until this season has always opened our meetings. This year, the prayer will end our meetings, since Vespers will rightfully take first precedence and begin our meetings henceforth. Over time though, the Oblate Prayer personally has become almost a perfect summary of what I, at least now, sense in my journey as St. Benedict's vision described in the Rule. One part of the little prayer that has really caught more and more of my own attention, especially in these last several years since retirement, is the petition within, that we all might be models of "... sacred leisure ...," one of four Christian challenges presented.

At first, as a retired father of five and grandfather of soon-to-be nine grandchildren, just the idea of "leisure" in this crazy, mixed-up world, from my point of view, can become a cloudy concept. And as one fortunate enough to live in a country well provided for, at least materially, in my attempts to seek Christ, when "leisure" becomes "sacred leisure," the cloudiness can become even more opaque. Distinguishing the difference can be a major day-to-day preoccupation in trying to keep focused on Christ.

Crazy, mixed up world?? Really? Maybe even that is not right. After all, isn't our country a material utopia for those of us lucky enough to be born in relative comfort here? Maybe it is not the world that is crazy and mixed up. Maybe, as a committed Christian who has a tendency to think too much, maybe the crazy and mixed up part is me, not the world!

So, which position is right? Well, at least in our commercialized, media-driven society, "leisure" seems far and away to be the overarching focus that takes precedence over the even remotely positioned contender, which arguably might be "work." Actually, maybe a better fit yet is "marketing leisure." After all, if we are anything, we are a consumer society, and as such, the universal compulsion to sell goods and services seems to be to market virtually everything in a way that will assure perfect happiness. So, if marketing happiness is the driver and the world is not crazy and mixed up, but I am with my outmoded even obscure Christian concepts, then I really have some major problems (crazy and mixed up indeed!).

For whatever reason, on the conscious level, if I turn on the TV for instance (actually, you can take any mode of marketing you choose, for the focus is universal), I immediately must deal with an almost obsessive media preoccupation with the "birds and bees." And I also wonder: is all this "birds and bees" stuff an overt or a covert effort to get my attention—in its assertion to guarantee pure bliss and happiness if I buy? Or is it both? This discussion could get very interesting very fast, especially for a Christian, and even white-hot for young Christian couples committed to passing on such an absurd frame of reference as the Christian faith to their children!

Well, in trying to figure out if the world is crazy or mixed up, or if it is me, I am already in way over my head, with no clue as to how to get out or even make sense of it. So "leisure" is a huge issue in my world, and as a committed Christian, "sacred leisure" is by far and away a major preoccupation. So, what do I do? The only thing I can do, like one constantly getting terrified and sometimes even injured by big lions, I can only run back again and again not only to the Rule, not only to the example of St. Benedict and the enormous treasury of all the other saints, but to Our Lord Himself. St. Teresa of Avila said in *Interior Castles* that the lions of this world waiting to devour us are real and prolific. And even if it is almost impossible to avoid them, especially in today's crazy and mixed up world, we are always promised victory if we persevere in our prayers. Well, I guess I am truly the one who is crazy and mixed up. I don't know how St. Teresa got involved in this, and there certainly are no lions roaming around!
