A Spiritual Director is one who is certified or degreed in Spiritual Direction. We have not spent time on this topic so it should be of particular importance to a number of you. Nancy will come with ideas on when spiritual direction might be important to us, how to select a spiritual director for ourselves, etc. After her talk, she will assist those of us who wish in obtaining a personal spiritual director.

CONCEPTION ABBEY RETEAT REFLECTIONS:

carol Barry, Obl. OSB, Lincoln Chapter: The weekend retreat at Conception Abbey was a wonderful experience, both relaxing and invigorating. Father Adam Ryan was an excellent retreat master. His topic was "Obedience", and he made several interesting points in a series of good-natured but no nonsense talks. Fr. Adam pointed out that the very idea of being obedient is counter cultural, but that practicing this discipline is a necessary part of our spiritual growth. He introduced the concept of "available reality" which he described as accepting reality as it is presented to us, and letting God into all aspects of our lives. Fr. Adam made numerous

references to Scripture and the Rule of Benedict to emphasize the importance of obedience and its role in active listening. He debunked the myth that obedience reflects a passive, lazy or inactive attitude towards life. True obedience to God is the opposite of passive. It reflects an active engagement in life, in listening to the word and will of God with the intention of following it. Fr Adam's description of obedience is not for the lazy or faint-hearted. I also enjoyed his observation that 2000 years of spiritual teaching and 100 years of psychotherapy can be summed up as "accept the unacceptable". The message I got was that it's too easy to be distracted, to sit back and let the culture/media tell me what is real and important. It takes conscious focus on God as the center of my life in order to move on and grow. Like obedience, that isn't always easy, but it is necessary.

One of my favorite parts of the retreat was the opportunity to be present as the monks came together six times a day to praise God. Listening to the monks praying in unison, chanting the psalms was beautiful and seemed so natural. I was even able to make it to the 6:00 AM Vigil prayers, thanks to the natural country alarm clock of birdsong (early, loud, and insistent). I wish everyone could have shared this time away. To leave everyday responsibilities, catch your breath, and be absorbed into a different sense of time marked by regular community prayer was a real blessing.

When I visualize God the Father standing obediently waiting for my yes or no, my obedience or disobedience, I am reminded yet again how much he loves me.
