A Word from St. Benedict's Rule

FAULTS AND CORRECTION

"If someone commits a fault at any work—while working in the kitchen, in the storeroom, in serving, in the bakery, in the garden, in any craft or anywhere else—either by breaking or losing something or failing in any other way in any other place, he must at once come before the abbot and community and of his own accord admit this fault and make satisfaction. If it is made known through another, he is to be subjected to a more severe correction. When the cause of the sin lies hidden in his conscience, he is to reveal it only to the abbot or to one of the spiritual elders, who know how to heal their own wounds as well as those of others, without exposing them and making them public."

Reflection
THE LOVE OF GOD

Love of God does not spring from study. It is not from others, after all, that we learn to enjoy the light, to yearn for life, and to love our parents and those who nourish us. Much less, then, does love of God arise from external teaching. Rather, as soon as people exist they have

the germ of reason, and this contains the power and impulse to love. In the school of divine instruction, therefore,

we but cultivate this power and wisely nourish it; thus, with God's help, it is brought to full development. For our part, we shall endeavor here, as far as the Holy Spirit enables us, to fan into flame this spark of love for God that is hidden within you.

Our first comment is that God has given us the power and ability to carry out all the commandments he has given us. We have no cause, then, to be upset, as though something out of the ordinary were being demanded of us; nor, on the other hand, do we have reason to be proud, as though we were giving back to God something he had not given us. When we use our God-given powers as we should, we lead a life made beautiful by virtue; but if we misuse them, we slip into vice. Indeed, the very definition of vice is the misuse of the powers God gave us for doing good. The virtue God ask of us is, on the contrary, the use of these powers according to right conscience and God's law.

All that I have been saying is to be applied to love. Since we are bidden to love God, we are sure that from the first moment of life we have an innate power and ability to love. We need no external arguments to prove this; we know it by our own experience. We naturally desire what is good and beautiful, even though people differ as to what is good. So, too, we need no schooling to have affection for our relatives and neighbors, and we spontaneously lover our benefactors. But what is more beautiful than God? What is more pleasing and sweeter to the mind than God's greatness? What desire is stronger and more ardent than the one God instills into the purified soul that cries out: "I am wounded by love"? The splendor of divine beauty is beyond all telling.
