
A Word from St. Benedict's Rule MAKING SATISFACTION

"If someone commits a fault while at any work—while working in the kitchen, in the storeroom, in serving, in the bakery, in the garden, in any craft or anywhere else—either by breaking or losing something or failing in any other way in any other place, he must at once come before the abbot and community and of his own accord admit his fault and make satisfaction. If it is made known through another, he is to be subjected to a more severe correction. When the cause of the sin lies hidden in his conscience, he is to reveal it only to the abbot or to one of the spiritual elders, who knows how to heal their own wounds as well as those of others, without exposing them and making them public."

MEET THE SISTERS: SISTER MARIELLE

Sister Marielle celebrated her fifty years of religious profession at Sacred Heart Monastery, Yankton, South Dakota, on July 11, 2015, in the presence of her community, family, and friends. S. Marielle was born on June 3, 1944, to the late John and Amalia, as the youngest in a family of three girls and a boy. At the age of six,

she began classes in a rural school a half mile from her farm home, the same farm where her father had been born and raised, in Bow Valley, Nebraska. S. Marielle was one of three first graders and her teacher was her oldest sister. As a student at Mount Marty High School, she came to know the Benedictine Sisters. Marielle feels she was attracted to religious life as long as she could remember. There was that desire to know God and to develop a close relationship with God and to help others. She finally succumbed to that desire when she entered Sacred Heart Convent in August 1963.

As a Benedictine Sister, S. Marielle zealously shared her love of scripture and theology in thirtytwo years of teaching religious studies at Mount Marty College. Her excellent resource book, *Beginning Biblical Studies*, is a valuable tool for all who seek to improve their knowledge of facts related to biblical history and religious studies.

Reflecting on her entrance into religious life, Sister Marielle stated, "I entered the community less than a year after Vatican Council II began in October 1962. As a result, I lived through the tumultuous years of the later 1960s and early 1970s when United States culture, the Catholic Church, and religious life were constantly undergoing monumental changes. While that made it much more challenging to discern and choose religious life, from today's vantage point, I can see that the long and sometimes very difficult process of discerning and making a commitment to monastic life in such times made me much stronger in that commitment. As St. Benedict tells us, monastic life requires lifelong, repeated transformations of life that will continue in the vears to come."

Marielle made monastic profession on June 29, 1965, and now, fifty years later, she offers two quotations that summarize what that life means to her. The first is a familiar line from Scripture: "God's faithful love endures forever." The second is St. Benedict's primary instruction to monastics "Prefer nothing to the love of Christ" (RB 4:21, 72:11).

SHM'S OBLATES' RETREAT

The Oblate Retreat at Sacred Heart Monastery took place April 22–24, 2016. Nine oblates attended. Retreatants from Nebraska



were Lincoln oblates Carol Barry and Shirley Cruickshank, and Lincoln oblate novice Mary Shada. The program included talks on "Praying the Psalms," presented by Sr. Marietta, "The Body and Prayer/Spirituality" by Sr. Corinne, "The Arts and Spirituality" by Sr. Cynthia, and "Lectio Divina" by Sr. Sharon Ann, filling in for an ailing Sr. Doris. The retreatants gained many powerful insights on each topic. They enjoyed the hospitality of the Sacred Heart Sisters and the beautiful surroundings of the monastery. The retreat will be repeated in the fall.
