#### ST. GERTRUDE THE GREAT

St. Gertrude was born on the 6<sup>th</sup> of January in the year 1256 at Eisleben, Germany, a small town in the county of Mansfield. When Gertrude attained the age of five she was placed in the famous Benedictine Abbey of Rodersdorf. Later St. Gertrude joined the order of Benedictine. The Lord appeared to St. Gertrude and told her to love no other book but the Bible and the works of the Fathers of the Church. St. Gertrude was the first great apostle of devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Gertrude was one with a bright, free, joyous spirit; because she loved God so purely and so entirely. A loving heart will always be a thankful heart. So the continual incense of thanksgiving which ascended from the heart of Gertrude before the Eternal Throne, was but the fragrant aroma of the love which burned daily deeper and brighter within her.

As a bride of Christ, St. Gertrude began to speak to the heart of His chosen one and to withdraw to listen without distraction or hindrance to those whispers of His love. Jesus came, as He mostly does, to His beloved ones, when she performed an act of humility and obedience.

The Sisters were not long in perceiving that St. Gertrude was favored by Heaven. One religious who was long tempted by temptation was warned in a dream to apply to St. Gertrude for relief and recommend herself to her prayers. The moment she complied with this, the temptation ceased.



It appeared that Gertrude was specially designed by Providence to help others in her lifetime by her merits and intercessions. She was well favored by the gift of counsel with which she was singularly favored.

Another person of great Sanctity who was praving for the saint, felt a singular impulse of her affection for which she believed to be supernatural. She asked our Lord, what it is He beheld in this Virgin that obliges Him to behold her with such high esteem and love her so much. The Lord replied His goodness alone obliges Him and she contains and perfects in her soul five virtues which pleases Him above all others. "She possesses purity by continual influences of my grace; Humility amidst the great diversity of gifts which I have bestowed on her; true benignity which makes her desire the salvation of the whole world for My greater glory; true fidelity, spreading abroad without reserve, all her treasures for the same end. She possesses a consummate charity; for she loves

2. Should we have a snowstorm that seems hard to judge, an e-mail will be sent. For those without e-mail, please call someone with e-mail.


