A WORD FROM ST. BENEDICT'S RULE

The twelfth step is to let humility shape the way you carry yourself every bit as much as it shapes your thoughts, so that it makes a real difference in how you act at common prayer or out in the garden; when making a trip away from the community or when you're on the job. Remember, every rung of the ladder connects prayer to action. Whether the climber is sitting, walking, or just standing around, humility should shape her whole posture. Since she is aware of her sin and weakness, she should always live as if she were before the Lord for the final reckoning, constantly praying in her heart the prayer that the publican said with downcast eyes: Lord, I am a sinner, not worthy to look up to heaven (Luke 18:13b). And likewise, the psalmist's prayer: I am bowed down and humbled in every way (Psalm 37 [38]:7-9).

We mourn the passing of Nancy Ludden, an oblate of the Lincoln Chapter, who passed away on December 10, 2018. Nancy made her final oblation on January 14, 2001. May she rest in peace.

FEASTOF ST. SCHOLASTICA

We celebrate the feast of St. Scholastica, twin sister of St. Benedict, on February 10. She established numerous monasteries for women during her lifetime. The Dialogues of St. Gregory the Great tell of her last visit with her brother. Not wanting to leave their meeting, she prayed to God to intervene. He sent a storm that delayed their departure, allowing for more time for prayer. She died soon afterwards and was buried by Benedict in the tomb he had prepared for himself.

SHORTER CHRISTIAN PRAYER INSTRUCTIONS

On the Monday of the Baptism of the Lord, January 13, 2019, we will switch to Week I on page 54. We will be in ordinary time from January 13 until Ash Wednesday, March 6, 2019. On the first Sunday of Lent, March 10, 2019, we begin Week I with Sunday Evening Prayer I on page 37. The antiphons for Sundays in Lent are in red. At the Reading turn to pages 405-428. One week of text is given for the Lenten season.

We continue in the Lenten prayers until Palm Sunday April 14, 2019. At the Reading, turn to page 429. The Easter Triduum begins on Holy Thursday, April 18, turn to page 436. On Easter Sunday, April 21, 2019, we start Week I. During the Easter Season we turn at the Reading to pp. 464-486. We remain in the Easter season until Pentecost Sunday, June 9, 2019.
