"Today I reaped the benefits for prayerfully walking three labyrinths of life. The first labyrinth consisted of a soft small rocky winding path. My prayerful walk left my imprint on the narrow path of life along with what appeared to be other imprints.

The second labyrinth of life consisted of a somewhat narrower defined path. Easily to step off and look back to gather my forward right path motion.

The third labyrinth of life consisted of a well-defined narrow path. Still stepping to the side while prayerfully walking forward on that narrow path to the goal; the center of the labyrinth. Pause, hesitate, and keep moving forward toward my goal.



Once reaching my goal, I stay there awhile to contemplate. Then, move again on that tweaked narrow winding path called life: more peaceful and clear minded with Vitamin D from the sunshine and exercise from prayerfully walking the labyrinth. 


Reading assignments for Cell groups in **Transformed by God's Word: Discovering the Power of Lectio and Visio Divina** by Stephen Binz are as follow:
